PROJECT ABSTRACT:

In recent years, people have come to view family violence as a problem that includes any form of harm committed between people in any kind of family or whānau relationship. But many forms of harm that are commonly experienced within families—such as controlling behaviour or technological abuse—are often overlooked or under-identified by law enforcement. In this project, we will examine archival records for family violence cases reported to New Zealand Police and record the different types of harm people experienced. We will determine the extent to which different forms of harm are currently being identified in police reports. Our findings will enhance understandings of the harms present in families affected by family violence and provide implications for how police can better identify and respond to prevent ongoing harm.
